Luawa-Yiehun Moravian Church - Sierra Leone

I want to tell you how the Lord has blessed Safiatu Braima. When Safie and Mohamed left for Sierra Leone in 2008, we purchased a relatively inexpensive insurance policy to be used for medical evacuation. We doubted that it would ever be used, but we thought if Mohamed had another attack of malaria it might be necessary to get him back to the USA for treatment. Little did we know that the bite of a poisonous ant would require medical evacuation.

Safie was bit in late November and admitted to the hospital in Freetown, Sierra Leone on December 1st. The medical care there appears to be very primitive. She was given antibiotics, but her condition continued to worsen; she was in severe pain, anemic, and unable to eat. On December 20th we received a call asking us to get her home for treatment. I immediately called AirMed, the company from whom we had purchased the

medical evacuation insurance. They were fantastic. They worked with me constantly throughout the day until we had contacted the proper medical professionals in Sierra Leone and various doctors in Charlotte to arrange the evacuation. Within 8 hours the transport was organized, and on Monday AirMed dispatched a private jet (Hawker 800-for those of you who are interested in that type of thing) equipped with medical personnel and everything they would need to bring Safie home quickly and safely.

In route to Freetown, the plane was delayed at one of its fuel stops, but arrived in Freetown Wednesday morning just after day break where Mohamed and Safie were waiting at the airport. AirMed could have arrived Tuesday night, but evidently there are no night-time

landings allowed at the Freetown airport. After a tearful farewell to Mohamed and a flawless flight back across the Atlantic, AirMed landed in Charlotte

Wednesday evening about 7:30 pm Safie was taken to Presbyterian Hospital via ambulance where she was greeted by Dr. Jamie Davis, an Emergency Room physician who is a member of Little Church on the Lane and whose son Jack is currently ministering in Sierra Leone with the

Braimas. Dr. Davis had been in contact with AirMed throughout the day and had spoken with the medical team during the transit to get an update on Safie's condition. Also to greet her and examine her at the hospital was Dr. William (Jake) Jacobs, a surgeon and member of Little Church who went to Sierra Leone last summer along with Dr. Davis and

During the past decade the Mission Society budgets exceeded return on investments due to our quest to support all of our missionary programs. The economic downturn during 2008 and 2009 worsened the Society's budget challenges which resulted in my letter requesting contributions just before Christmas. On behalf of the Mission Society, thank you for your contributions. A total of \$4095 was received. Included is a copy of the Mission Society 2010 budget which includes 2008 and 2009 budgets for reference.

As you can see, the Mission Society is not out of the woods yet. The need to address the Society's budget continues. For this we continue to ask for your prayerful consideration for contributions. We also ask that you

consider including the Society's need in your "wills."

Our economic status does not exempt us from being a blessing to others less fortunate. As you all know, on January 12, 2010 a 7.0 magnitude earthquake struck Haiti. Haiti being the poorest country in the western hemisphere is in need of our help. As help pours in from all over the world, let's keep the Haitian people in our thoughts and prayers. We are all eager to help, but let's allow the professionals time to establish security and the infrastructure that is necessary before mission teams can start rebuilding and ministering.

As in Psalm 91:12, "I will say of the Lord, He is my refuge and my fortress: my God; in him will I trust."

Mission Society Education Report - 2009

Available funds for Young Partners in Mission 2009 (YPIM) were \$12,100. \$9,190 was allocated in 112 grants to youth from 13 Moravian congregations and/or BWM. Available funds for Short Term (ST) crews was \$9,600. \$6,260 was allocated in 44 grants to adults from 15 Moravian congregations and BWM.

Most of the grants were in the amounts of \$40 (Laurel Ridge Mission camps), or \$60 (Mississippi), or \$300 (missions in other countries). Grants of \$50 each helped 10 youth attend Convo 2009, which included a local mission experience.

The number of grants requested for youth increased slightly, and the short-term grants remained about the same as 2008 and 2007. This report does not include the numbers of youth and adults who have gone on mission trips without requesting funds from the Mission Society. Some congregations were so inspired to send their members on mission trips and that they were blessed

to be able to fully fund what was needed for those willing to give their time and talents to the Lord.

Where did they go? God sent them to Costa Rica, Nicaragua, Kenya, Mississippi, Labrador, Africa, Tanzania, Honduras, Canada, and Laurel Ridge mission camps.

Many prayers have gone before, during, and after mission endeavors. Preparation for a young partner in mission or an adult short-term trip begins with spiritual and cultural training. Mark Ebert is the lead trainer.

Evaluation is an important component of each mission. Individuals and groups using YPIM or ST funds have the opportunity to share God's work and inspiration by reporting at the Mission Ambassadors Dinner, the bimonthly meeting of Mission Society Board of Directors, or to the Mission Possible prayer gatherings.

Many thanks to Shelia Beaman, Mark McSwain, and all who provided pictures for the

Mission CD which was made available to all the congregations to learn more about mission work supported by the Mission Society and Board of World Mission.

Mission Possible will have a birthday on the First Friday in February! The monthly meeting for praise, mission news, and prayer will be on February 5 at Christ Moravian Church Fellowship Building, 7:00 P.M. We are so happy to have Michael, Ceci, and Blessing Tesh here to give a personal report from the Ray of Hope Orphanage in Kenya.

Please come - hear what God is doing; pray - join the intercessory prayer for hearts in Kenya; pray - thank God for all His blessings; and listen - what is God calling you and I to do, where is God calling you and I to go?

YOU Can Ensure That Moravians Keep Sending

In its February newsletter, the Moravian Ministries Foundation offered some pertinent advice to those giving thought to planning their estates in 2010. Because of the economic challenges of recent years, it is expected that fewer people will create gift annuities, charitable trusts, and the like. The Foundation is encouraging people to consider setting aside, at least, 10% of their estate for Moravian cause(s) that are closest to their hearts. This would be a wonderful opportunity to designate funds from your estate to the Moravian Mission Society, South, Inc. This will allow the Mission Society to continue sponsoring programs and sending missionaries to share the Good News of Christ's salvation around the world.

It is a simple strategy to execute. It allows the donor to hold on to his/her assets and to use them as s/he sees fit during his/her lifetime. If a need like an illness or a grandchild's college

education arises, the donor simply acts in his/her best interests. Usually, unless something unforeseen occurs, once someone makes a commitment through their will, it is honored. Sometimes the final value of the 10% is different than they might have planned or expected; however, our view is regardless of the amount, that 10% will support more ministry, than not having it.

Paul McLaughlin of the Foundation often shares, "If everyone attending the session left ten percent of their estates to their church or favorite ministry, just think about the good work that could be done!" He also points out, "the remaining 90% is still available for family members and others you wish to remember. It's truly a win-win approach.

Example of bequest language. Please feel free to change the numbers or percentages as you desire.

1. Bequest of cash

"I bequeath the sum of \$10,000 to the Mission Society, South, Inc. of Winston-Salem, NC."

2. Bequest of a percent of the estate

"I devise and bequeath 20% of the remainder and residue of property owned at my death, whether real or personal, and wherever located to Mission Society South, Inc. of Winston-Salem, NC."

3. Contingent Bequest

"If my brother John Doe survives me, I devise and bequeath 20% of the remainder and residue of property owned at my death, whether real or personal, and wherever located to John Doe. If John Doe does not survive me, then I devise and bequeath 20% of my residuary estate, whether real or personal property and wherever located to Mission Society, South, Inc. of Winston-Salem, NC."

We hope to have more chickens this month. This helps with nutrition and we can sell eggs and buy more chickens.

We are still waiting for the cow ministry to come together. We want a cow that is already expecting a calf, so we can get milk. The goal is for Ray of Hope to support itself.

We have \$5,000 to put up two buildings with solar systems. We want to have a solar unit in each

house."

Michael shares "A beloved young student, Bi Bi has passed away from malaria. It was a terrible shock. John and Habona were there with her. Bi Bi had been back at school from the holidays for two weeks when this happened. Bi Bi had been an encourager to the other children. They looked up to her."

Our daughter, Blessing, is one year and one month old.

2 other men from Little Church. At the hospital it quickly became evident that Safie needed all the medical care that the USA had to offer. She was given blood, pain medication, and a thorough examination. Blood tests, MRI, and consultations with specialist were all set in place. By the time I saw her on Thursday morning, she had improved drastically; she was smiling, eating, and grateful to God for His many blessings.

Safie has a long road ahead of her and will be probably be in the hospital for a good while. One of her doctors commented that if she had waited another 5 days before coming home the outcome would likely have been drastically different.

So, please join me in praising God for his provision of: (1) cell phones that allowed us to communicate immediately half-way

around the world (2) AirMed and their wonderful, caring, and efficient staff (3) doctors and nurses who were willing to talk to us on their day off, give us their cell phone numbers, and go out of their way to be helpful (4) God's people who prayed without ceasing (5) US Customs and officials of other governments who cooperated with the evacuation.

Our God IS so good! He heals hearts, minds, and bodies, and we give Him praise and glory. A community gathers for worship on Sunday mornings at Luawa-Yiehun Moravian Church in Sierra Leone, West Africa. "Kane N'gorma!" (Praise God!) is heard with every greeting. The Gospel message is read, first in English, then in Mende, the language of the people. You can hear joy in

the voices of people singing. Over 100 children crowd into one small room to hear and learn about Jesus and the love he has for them.

Sunday mornings in Luawa-Yiehun looked very different a year ago. There was no church, no Gospel message, and no community. In less than one year, Mohamed and Safiatu Braima, missionaries from Little Church on the Lane in Charlotte, NC, have planted a thriving, Christ-centered church in the village of Luawa-Yiehun. Through the power of the Holy Spirit and the support of the Moravian church, the Braimas are bringing the message of Jesus Christ and God's saving grace to the people of Sierra Leone.
